WHAT is Female Genital Mutilation, how is it practiced in India?


- FGM/C is the total or partial removal of the external female genitalia for non-medical purposes [1]
- In India, practitioners usually perform Type I or Type IV FGM/C as defined by the World Health Organisation [2]

Who practices it?

In India, FGM/C is prevalent and practiced by Islamic communities like Dawoodi, Alvi and Suleimani Bohras, as well as certain sections of Sunni Muslims.

INDEPENDENT STUDY - 2018

- 75% daughters of respondents in sample study were mutilated
- □ 92.5% cut by traditional circumciser

Indian Government's Response to FGM/C

- No attempts to collect data of the prevalence and nature of FGM/C practiced in India.
- No move to introduce a law and policy to deal with the practice and achieve the goal to eliminate it.



No recommendations against FGM/C have been made by any country to India

On the contrary India has made

recommendations on FGM to Guinea, Mali

and Gambia

- □ A charity run by religious head of Bohra Community, spent nearly £770,000 defending one FGM/C prosecution in Australia


India has ratified International Treaties on women and child rights

- Convention on the Rights of the Child (**CRC**),
- Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW) [with reservations]
- International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR)
- International Covenant on Economic and Social and Cultural Rights (ICESCR)





Conduct research and collect data on the national prevalence of FGM/C in the country across all communities who are known to practice FGM/C



Legally adopt the WHO's definition of FGM and pass a law that criminalizes FGM/C, Khatna, Khafz as a human rights violation in India Establish a national action plan to eradicate the harmful practice of FGM/C in all its forms across the country and within the Bohra community, including the dedication of resources to prevention and education aspects.
