Sudwind believes that abolition of the death penalty for crimes related to drugs, weapons and explosives, in addition with the fact that there has not been any execution since 2006 in Jordan was a major leap forward, yet Sudwind encourages Jordan to abolish the death penalty from the law.

We also urge Jordan to withdraw the reservation on article 9 paragraph 2 of CEDAW.

The inability of Jordanian women to pass their nationality to their spouses and children has a huge negative impact on such families from many different aspects, namely: economical, social, and psychological. Let's not forget children, in these cases, are extremely vulnerable, and they are especially deprived of their rights.

The number of women in decision making positions is considerably low, which is clearly visible in the judiciary and political institutions of power.

To improve the human rights situation in the country we recommend Jordan to:

- Ratify the Optional Protocol to the Convention against Torture and Other Cruel, Inhuman or Degrading Treatment or Punishment,
- Withdraw all reservations on the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women,
- Ratify the Optional Protocol to the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights and
- to ratify the 1951 convention relating to the status of refugees and its protocol

Although there were only 13 recommendations left to be examined by Jordan, the neglectance of responding in due time, left NGO's with a bear chance to respond to these recommendations thoroughly.
