FOREWORD

Kenya's march towards the creation of a human rights state and society is irreversible. Anchored on a progressive Constitution, a vibrant civil society, strong and independent institutions, and a vigilant population the country's ambition to secure and promote human rights and the dignity of humanity will be fully realized. The Government of Kenya is committed to its human rights obligations both regionally and internationally.

The Universal Periodic Review (UPR) is a peer review mechanism of the United Nations Human Rights Council (HRC) that examines the human rights performance of all United Nations member states, once every four and a half years. The ultimate goal of the UPR is to improve the human rights situation in all countries. Kenya's human rights performance was reviewed by the UPR Working Group on the 22nd -27th January 2015, at the 21st Session of the Human Rights Council in Geneva, Switzerland. The UPR Working Group made important recommendations to the Government of Kenya, designed to ensure that the Kenyan people enjoy their rights and fundamental freedoms to the fullest.

Kenya accepted a large number of recommendations secure in the knowledge that it had the necessary political will and commitment to ensure the dignity and wellbeing of all Kenyans. To ensure the full implementation of the accepted recommendations within a four and a half year time frame the Government of Kenya has developed this Implementation Matrix for the 2nd Cycle Universal Periodic Review Recommendations- a strong reflection of Kenya's strong commitment to its international human rights obligations.

The matrix was developed through a highly consultative process bringing in all relevant ministries, departments and agencies; civil society organizations; national human rights commissions and development partners. Some recommendations made by other treaty monitoring bodies such as the Committee on Economic Social and Cultural Rights and the Committee on the Rights of the Child are included.

The matrix outlines individual recommendations, specific priority action areas and indicators to measure progress in the realization of human rights. It is the fundamental duty of every state actor to respect, protect, and fulfil human rights and therefore the matrix identifies these actors and designates specific responsibilities for the realization of particular rights. The Plan will be used by the national and county governments to monitor progress with respect to the full implementations of the recommendations.
