ICTUR was founded in 1987 in order to defend, extend, and raise awareness of trade union rights and their violations worldwide. ICTUR was founded in response to 'an unprecedented frontal attack on trade union rights on the part of transnational employer groups and governments acting on their behalf' in order 'to take up the struggle for liberation from neo-colonialist and transnational corporation exploitation'. The organisation is structured as a network of trade unions, lawyers and human rights organisations. ICTUR undertakes letter writing, trial monitoring, and research and publishing activities. Among its publications are: *International Union Rights* journal (since 1993); the *World Map of Freedom of Association* (5th edition, 2017); and the reference book *Trade Unions of the World* (7th edition, 2016). ICTUR has consultative (roster) status with the UN ECOSOC and it is accredited to the ILO Special List of INGOs, since 1993.
